The possession, consumption, trafficking and sale of alcohol and/or drug substances aboard is strictly prohibited during the seafarers' employment agreement. All Company's seafarers are subject to testing and screening for drugs and alcohol abuse. The Master has the authority to carry out an alcohol test whenever he suspects that a seafarer is under alcohol influence.

Any seafarer not complying with the Company's Drug and Alcohol Policy **shall be dismissed** immediately and shall not be rerecruited on-board the Company's ships.

During a safety round in accommodation and deck area, it was determined that some places of the catwalk gratings were in poor condition and in need of maintenance.



During painting the funnel, an OS was working without a safety helmet underneath another seaman.

What happened:

While disposing garbage, a crewmember was seen beneath the garbage drums that were being lifted.

What happened: During hold cleaning and heaving up cargo residues, a crewmember was standing below a full bucket being lifted up.

Observe situational awareness and safe working practices when working with suspended loads.

Do NOT walk or work beneath suspended loads.

SWA (Stop Work Authority) was initiated and the Cook was advised to wear plastic gloves.


What happened: The messman used the knife for raw fish in order to cut bread.

IMPORTANT REMINDER!

QHSE Safety Campaign # 1/21

As part of the current QHSE safety campaign on pilot transfer arrangements and pilot ladder safety, the following finding was identified and properly rectified on board a fleet ship: "One step of the pilot ladder was found damaged":





A pilot ladder in poor condition, with worn-out steps and side ropes is not a good welcome sign for a pilot onboard a ship. It is easy to inspect the steps every time the ladder is used. Make sure the steps are in good shape and clean, ready to use.

US: Update on Drug Smuggling

n increase has been observed in the number of cases of illegal drugs being found onboard ships in the US, according to data provided by local correspondents to Britannia P&I Club.

In the past the drugs were often smuggled on board from ports in Colombia but, in order to try and avoid the scrutiny of US authorities, smugglers have recently sought to do so in other Central and South American countries.

In one recent case the drugs were taken on board via small boats in open waters off Chile and Peru and other cases show drugs being smuggled from Ecuador, Guatemala and the Caribbean.

The US authorities have increased the measures to detect drugs, with extra ships and specialist teams deployed.

Local correspondents recommend that when ships are visiting ports in Colombia or Mexico, or other Central or South American ports, additional securi-



ty precautions be employed, such as maintaining guards at the berth and on deck, added watch (especially while in port and just after sailing), regular shipboard inspections while in port, records made in the log books, etc.

If prior to arrival in the US, the Master suspects that drug smuggling may be taking place on board, he should immediately contact the office.

IMCA Report-Two workers Die in Ballast Tank



he Workplace Safety and Health Council of Singapore (WSH) reported an incident about two workers passing out and dying in a dredger's ballast tank.

As IMCA reports, a supervisor entered a dredging vessel's ballast tank, which is a confined space, for an inspection. The supervisor entered the tank without any appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and did not check if the confined space was safe.

Shortly after entering, he collapsed and passed out. After some time, another worker entered the tank in an attempt to rescue the supervisor, but also passed out upon entry.

A third worker attempted a rescue as well, but he too collapsed inside the tank. The rest of the crew subsequently introduced forced ventilation into the

tank. The second worker eventually regained consciousness and managed to climb out of the tank. The supervisor and the third worker were later extricated by the Singapore Civil Defence Force but unfortunately did not survive. This tragic accident highlights the invisible dangers of confined spaces.

Recommendations

- Do not open up any manhole into a confined space without proper authorization;
- Do not enter any confined space unless you have had appropriate training;



South Korea: ECA and Vessel Speed Reduction (VSR) program * Reminder *

s a reminder further to our newsletter issue 158 and 162, the South Korean Ministry of Maritime Affairs and Fisheries ("MOF") has announced an air quality control programme that defines selected South Korean ports and areas as Emission Control Areas (ECA).

A programme with maximum sulphur limits (0.1%) and speed limits will support the effectiveness of the programme. The following ports/areas are covered by the air quality control programme:

- Incheon, Pyeongtaek, Dangjin Area
- Yeosu, Gwangyang area
- Busan
- Busan (west) area
- Ulsan area

From 1 September 2020 it will be mandatory to use fuel with a max. 0.1% sulphur content while berthing or anchoring during the times set out below:

Berthing: 1 hour after completion of berthing until 1 hour before de-berthing.

Anchoring: 1 hour after completion of anchoring until 1 hour before leaving anchor.


From 1 January 2022, it will be mandatory to use fuel with a max. 0.1% sulphur content while navigating within the ECAs.

Reportedly, the use of Scrubbers or Exhaust Gas Cleaning Systems will continue to be allowed for compliance purposes, but it is recommended that verification of this should be obtained from local agents or correspondents prior to the ship's arrival.

Relevant information will also be included in company's Technical Circular 59 and circulated to the fleet in due course.

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Malaria Prevention *Reminder*



•Be aware of the risk: The ship management needs to review all the ports to be visited, and check the malaria risk. This cannot be done simply by looking at what country the port is in, as risk varies in different areas within each country and the risk on the coast has to be compared to the risk inland.

ccording to WHO report, global malaria mortality fell by 60% over the period 2000 to 2019. The African Region achieved impressive reductions in its annual malaria death toll – from 680 000 in 2000 to 386 000 in 2019. Countries in South -East Asia made particularly strong progress, with reductions in cases and deaths of 73% and 74%, respectively. India contributed to the largest drop in cases region-wide – from approximately 20 million to about 6 million. Twenty-one countries have eliminated malaria over the last 2 decades and, of these, 10 countries were officially certified by WHO as malaria free.

However, it is stated that malaria still consists a maritime problem for the following reasons:

- unawareness of the fact that malaria is a serious and potentially fatal disease
- insufficient information regarding the clinical picture of malaria
- no or insufficient use of anti-mosquito measures and the classical protective medication
- increasing resistance of many new malaria strains to the medication
- the fluctuating frequency of malaria occurrence in the most dangerous areas, which leads to miscalculation of the real risk.

Therefore, we would like to remind you of the following prevention measures to seafarers and shipowners:

- •Avoid being bitten: The best way to prevent malaria infection is to take measures to avoid being bitten. The mosquitoes tend to respond to light in their feeding habits and are most active in low light hours after dusk and in the hours prior to dawn. It is important that repellents are used between dusk and dawn to prevent being bitten. Use a repellent that has DIETHYL-M-TOLUAMIDE (DEET), to be renewed every four/six hours. Use clothing that covers the body, such as long trousers and long sleeves, socks etc.
- •Take anti-malarial drugs: The captain has to make sure that everybody onboard takes the prophylactic medication. Although many people are very reluctant to take medication when they do not feel sick, in case of malaria risk they will have to be persuaded to do so.
- •Early diagnosis and treatment for a febrile illness: Immediate diagnosis of malaria is essential since complications arise within hours or days of the first symptom, and because falciparum malaria can rapidly progress to lifethreatening disease. If the diagnosis of malaria is suspected onboard, treat first, and then arrange for definitive diagnosis.

A good reference regarding Malaria can be found in International Medical Guide for Ships (3rd Edition) by the World Health Organization.

agnitude 7.1 quake hits Davao Oriental, while Haiti is struck by a deadly 7.2 magnitude earthquake

A magnitude 7.1 earthquake shook Davao Oriental before dawn on Thursday 12/08/2021, the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology (Phivolcs) reported. Phivolcs said the tremor at 1:46 a.m. was tectonic in origin and had a depth of 39 kilometers. It was 95 kilometers southeast of Governor Generoso.



Another powerful earthquake has struck the Caribbean nation of Haiti, killing at least 304 people and injuring more than 1,800 on Saturday 14/08/2021.

The 7.2-magnitude quake hit the west of the country on Saturday morning, toppling and damaging buildings including churches and hotels. Haiti is still recovering from a devastating 2010 earthquake.





Metro Manila's Covid cases spike

The seven-day average of Covid-19 cases in Metro Manila spiked by 62 percent, with 2,823 new cases logged on 07/08/2021. The caseload is the highest since May 2, when a modified enhanced community quarantine was clamped on the National Capital Region (NCR).

"The rapid growth rate of cases in the NCR strongly suggests the possibility that the surge is driven by

of the Delta variant over the previous dominant variants," independent research group OCTA said.

"The decision by the national government to impose a strict lockdown in the NCR on August 6 is timely," the group said. "If the decision was delayed to August 15, the NCR would have breached 4,500 new cases per day, which would likely extend the lockdown and cause more negative impact on people and the economy," OCTA noted.

12M fully vaccinated against Covid-19 in the Philippines

More than 12 million individuals in the country have been fully vaccinated against Covid-19, Malacañang



announced on Thursday. Palace spokesman Harry Roque Jr. said 12,027,383 people have been fully vaccinated as of August 11. A total of 26,127,502 doses have been administered, 14,100,119 of which were given as a first dose.

Roque thanked those who received their shots for their continued confidence in the government's vaccination program. "Ito po ang ating depensa laban sa Covid-19 at mga variants, kasama na ang patuloy nating pag-mask, hugas at social distancing (The vaccination is our defense against Covid-19 and other variants, together with the continued wearing of face masks, washing of hands and physical distancing)," he said. The country passed the 12-million mark as the National Capital Region spent its first week in enhanced community quarantine (ECQ). Despite the lockdown, the vaccinations will continue in the region.

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Greece faces 'disaster of unprecedented proportions' as wildfires ravage the country

Evia, Greece (CNN)-Greece is facing a "natural disaster of unprecedented proportions," as 586 wildfires burn in "all corners" of the country, according to Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis.

Sixty-three organized evacuations have taken

place in the past few days, Mitsotakis said in a televised address on Monday, 9th August 2021.

Greece's second-largest island, Evia, has been at the center of the storm of fires that have rayaged.

the center of the storm of fires that have ravaged the country. Over half of the island has burned, ac-

cording to local officials.

The fires have been devastating for Greeks who rely on the forests for their livelihood and their produce -- including resin, honey, olives and figs that have been destroyed in the flames.



Floods in London are the Latest sign big Cities aren't ready for climate change



CNN Jul. 27- Cars stranded in streets turned into rivers. Bus passengers rescued by raft. Train stations submerged. This is the scene in London after heavy rainfall over the weekend put parts of the city underwater.

It's a brutal reminder that even some of the world's richest cities are dangerously unprepared for the kind of extreme weather that is becoming more common and more severe because of the climate crisis.

Alcohol use linked to nearly 750.000 Cancer

cases in 2020

Doctors are sounding the alarm over research showing a link between drinking alcohol and cancer. More than 700,000 new cancer cases were linked to alcohol consumption in 2020



— a time when many Americans reported drinking more.

The research, published in the July 13 edition of Lancet Oncology, found that over 4% of all new cancer cases in 2020 were caused by alcohol consumption. While most cancers linked to alcohol use were in people who have more than two drinks a day, more than 100,000 cases worldwide were in people who averaged less than that, the study said.

"Alcohol is an irritant. It irritates the lining of our mouth, of our throat, of our stomach. As our body tries to heal, sometimes it heals in abnormal ways that can lead to the very beginnings of cancer," said Dr. David Odell, an oncologist at Northwestern Medicine.

The human-Caused Climate Crisis is "unequivocal" Major UN Report says

A state-of-the-science report from the United Nations' Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change says the world has rapidly warmed 1.1 degrees Celsius higher than pre-industrial levels, and is now careening toward 1.5 degrees — a critical threshold that world leaders agreed warming should remain below to avoid worsening impacts.

Only by making deep cuts to greenhouse gas emissions, while also removing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, can we halt the precipitous trend.

"Bottom line is that we have zero years left to avoid

"Bottom line is that we have zero years left to avoid

dangerous climate change, because it's here," Michael E. Mann, a lead author of the IPCC's 2001 report, told CNN.
